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Have Thine Own Way, Lord

John 6:38

"For I have come down from heaven not to do my own will but the will of Him who sent me."

What a wonderful scripture to start the Advent season. So often we think of the Christmas Season as a time of excess; excess in food, festivities, gift shopping and giving, and decorating our homes. But as we begin Advent, we are called to remember that this is, more than anything, a time of waiting and a time of remembering the unforgettable and unfathomable gift of God's Son as our personal Lord and Savior.

Joshua 21:45

In 1968, composer, Burt Bacharach, and lyricist, Hal David, wrote a song entitled "Promises, Promises." It was recorded by the singer Dionne Warwick and quickly became a Billboard hit. That same year it became the title song for a new Broadway musical written by Neil Simon. The play, "Promises, Promises," focused on two young New Yorkers who worked for the same company and who both became disillusioned with life because of broken promises. The words of the chorus reflect the pain and indignation the central characters experienced, "Oh, promises, their kind of promises can just destroy a life. Oh, promises, those kinds of promises take all the joy from life." Many counselors and therapists agree that broken promises can induce stages of grief resembling those experienced after losing a loved one and can result in depression, and even suicide. The consequences of broken promises – whether made by a parent, sibling, friend, employer, or spouse -can be devastating and lasting. Many are left to wonder, "Who can I ever trust to keep a promise?"

The wonderful news for us as believers is that we serve a God who always keeps His promises! He did it for the Israelites, and He will do it for us! In this season of Advent, it is fitting for us to reflect on the fact that Jesus is the fulfillment of over 300 prophesies (or promises) made in the Old Testament! And it is especially appropriate that we consider some of the beautiful promises made to us by our Savior: John 6:35, "I am the bread of life;



he who comes to Me will not hunger, and he who believes in Me will never thirst." John 16:33, "These things I have spoken to you, so that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation but take courage; I have overcome the world." Hebrews 13:5, "I will never leave you, nor will I ever forsake you." Matthew 28:20, "... and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." John 14:3, "I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself, that where I am, there you may be also." And finally, the most marvelous promise of all, John 3:16, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him, shall not perish, but have eternal life." It is imperative that we, as believers, be people who keep our word, and that we share with others that there is One who never fails to keep His promises.

Luke 1:13

Lamentations 3:22-23

Thomas Obadiah Chisolm from Franklin, Kentucky, had fragile health which often confined him to bed. Between bouts of illness, he would have to push himself to put in extra hours at various jobs in order to make ends meet. After coming to Christ at age 27, Thomas found great comfort in the Scriptures, and in the fact that God was faithful to be his strength in time of illness and weakness and to provide his needs. His hymn, "Great Is Thy Faithfulness," is based on Lamentations 3:22-23.

Great is Thy faithfulness!/Great is Thy faithfulness!/Morning by morning new mercies I see./All I have needed Thy hand hath provided;/Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!

The parallel to the ruin caused by the recent hurricane in the hymnwriter's home region is striking. So many must feel hopeless and abandoned. Be Doers, Not Just Hearers

James 1:25

"But he who looks into the perfect law of liberty, and perseveres, being no hearer that forgets, but a doer that acts, he shall be blessed in his doing."

Most scholars feel that James, the writer of this passage, was the half-brother of Jesus. This was written after his brother, our Savior, had been crucified and resurrected – perhaps between 45-50 A.D.

James was writing, not to Christian Gentiles, but to Jewish followers of Jesus and instructing them in how they must act as followers of Jesus. The particular passage for today conveys a real truth which we often overlook. That truth must be received in a Christian's heart and expressed in one's life.

Just prior to this passage, in verse 22, James wrote "Be doers of the word and not hearers only." We can be certain that, with great pride, James could recall his brother's sermon which we know as the Sermon on the Mount, in which Jesus listed several activities which Christians must do and be blessed. And in today's passage, James is reminding the Jewish followers of Jesus that knowing the beatitudes and "doing" the beatitudes are two very different things. If we only listen to that sermon and do not feed the poor, for instance, it avails nothing. Later in his same letter, James boldly states, "Faith without works is dead" (vs. 2:17), emphasizing that claiming faith, but not acting upon it, is a useless (dead) exercise in "listening" instead of acting.

Dear Lord,

Impress upon us that the way to become an effective Christian is to recognize that the spoken and written message of Christianity is full of "action verbs" which should be acted upon. Amen.

The Little Clan

Micah 5:2

"But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who is one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from old, from ancient days."

God did not choose beautiful buildings or prominent locations to share His message to us. He chose a simple manger in a small insignificant city.

In 1 Corinthians 1:31 we read, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord." Doesn't that just touch your soul? Each Sunday at Christ Methodist, I see the face of God in each of you! In each conversation, I experience the warmth, love, and genuine desire to know God and share His message with



the world. We are in a place that looks nothing like a sanctuary. We have nothing to boast about...except for the One who we are called to boast in! And that is exactly how God started it - in a barn.

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Dear Lord,

We thank You for this reminder from Micah that You chose us not because of our position or our significance, but out of grace and mercy in Your love for us. Guide our thoughts in these next days as we celebrate Christ's birth and we remember where it all started. Amen.

Psalm 25:4

As we face each new day, let's open our hearts to be ready to receive God's guidance.

This picture of the moon was taken on October 16th of this year and it portrays what is called a Hunter's Moon which is the largest view of the moon from where we live.

The moon helps stabilize our planet's rotation which makes our climates steadier, and the moon causes the ocean tides. John 1:1-5, 9-14

In Him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it... The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through Him, the world did not recognize Him... The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth."

On this holy night, John's gospel invites us to ponder the vast mystery of Christmas from an eternal perspective: the Word, who was with God and who is God, has come to us in the person of Jesus Christ. We gather to celebrate the arrival of Jesus, the Light of the World. This moment isn't just a tradition, but a profound reminder that God did not leave us in darkness. From the beginning, God's Word brought life and order into existence, and on that first Christmas, His Word took on flesh, coming to dwell among us as Emmanuel—God with us. Unlike the more familiar nativity stories of shepherds, angels, and a manger, John's account pulls back the curtain on the grandeur of Christmas by revealing that the child born in Bethlehem is the very Creator, the Word through whom everything came into being.

Imagine the wonder of it - Jesus, the eternal Word, did not remain distant from our struggles and sins but entered into our brokenness, bringing God's light to dispel our deepest darkness. "The light shines in the darkness," John writes, "and the darkness has not overcome it." In a world marked by shadows of despair, conflict, and loss, the light of Christ shines



steadfastly, offering hope that endures beyond our circumstances. The light of Christ shines not only in the stable in Bethlehem, but in every corner of our world and in the depths of our hearts. This light shines in our joy and our struggles, in our peace and our sorrow, giving us hope and guiding us to the Father.

The Christmas story is more than history; it's a reality unfolding today. The miracle of Christmas happens every time we receive Jesus into our lives, letting His light transform our hearts and lives. This transformation draws us out of ourselves and into service to others, reflecting the love of Christ. As we meditate on this holy night, let us embrace the wonder of God's gift and share it by loving others with the same generous, sacrificial love He showed us.

As we gather on this Christmas Eve, we're invited to receive this Light into our lives anew. Jesus comes to bring us life—abundant, eternal, and freely offered to all who believe in His name. When we welcome Him, the light of Christ transforms us, igniting within us a love that reaches outward, warming and illuminating others. We become, in a sense, bearers of His light, called to reflect His love in a world that longs for it. Christmas is more than a season or a story; it's an invitation to allow the Word, who became flesh, to dwell within us and shine through us.
